Cool New Toy for Your Dog by Ken Wallace

Naya and D'Argo loudly (and some may say menacingly) "greet" the UPS truck each time it rumbles to a stop in front of our house. So much so that I fear the man in brown may one day turn and run before dropping the package on the porch.

If, however, D'Argo knew what was in the big box that was delivered a few weeks ago, he would have been smart to stifle his bark. Because if Mr. UPS turned and ran, D'Argo's would never have realized his dream of never-ending fetch. You see, along with the dogbiscuit peace offering the UPS man now routinely leaves with all packages, he dropped of the GoDogGo™,the first, and still the only, Automatic Fetch Machine for dogs.

How can I put this? D'Argo is a fetching maniac. A perfect day for him would be retrieving hundreds of balls (followed by running through the sprinklers, but that's another story). But as you can imagine, he can't throw the balls himself (something about not having opposable thumbs, I assume). So that means he needs a ball thrower. That, of course, would be me. Until now!

Yes, now D'Argo can play fetch by himself. The GoDogGo tennis ball launcher was designed to provide hours of healthy exercise and enjoyment for dogs. The GoDogGo is now D'Argo's personal playmate that's ready to play whenever he is!

According to the company website (www.godoggoonline.com) GoDogGo was designed to let people choose how much or how little interaction to have with their dog while he's playing with his new favorite dog toy.

GoDogGo is a remote-control tennis ball launcher designed specifically to play fetch. The manufacturer knows there will be days that you'll want to play with your dog and his new favorite dog toy and other days, when you're tired or busy, that you'd prefer your pooch entertain himself. GoDogGo was invented by a loving dog owner who felt the same way. That's why GoDogGo has both automatic and manual ball launching settings. From the remote control, you can set GoDogGo to any one of three modes. In the two automatic modes. your GoDogGo will launch tennis balls to your dog every 7 or 15 seconds. In the manual mode, your GoDogGo will launch a new ball with each press of the button.

GoDogGo was meant to be used in small yards, big yards, dog parks, and

Schutzhund: Theory and Training Methods

open wide fields. The launch distance is adjustable from 15 to 30 feet, depending on the size of the outdoor space your dog will be playing in (I wish the balls flew farther, but add to the 30 feet the natural bounce of tennis balls, and they certainly go far enough for D'Argo).

We've been trying (not too hard, mind you) to train D'Argo to drop the balls in the bucket, but it's not necessary for your dog to put the balls back in the bucket to enjoy his GoDogGo — you can

always reload the bucket yourself. The manufacturer says that most GoDogGo-addicted dogs have never been trained to do it and still love playing with GoDogGo. I agree.

Since you may want to use the GoDogGo in your backyard or at the park, it can be powered by either six "D" batteries or an electrical outlet (with the included AC adapter). The manufacturer says that when using batteries, GoDogGo will run for up to five funfilled hours.

The GoDogGo is D'Argo's absolute favorite toy. It's great to watch him anticipate the toss as the little launch motor winds up (You know that GSD head-cocking thing they all do) — then "whoomph" out comes the ball and off goes D'Argo only to run back and listen for the motor and wait for the next ball.

At a cost of about \$150, the GoDogGo is not cheap, but if you have a dog that loves to fetch, check out the GoDogGo. D'Argo is glad we did!•









D'Argo sits and waits patiently for the GoDogGo to throw its next ball. When he hears the whir of the motor winding up he gets ready and them, Whoomph, a ball shoots out. Holding up to 15 balls, the GoDogGo entertains him all day every day.

Schutzhund: The Basics excerpted from www.dvgamerica.com

Schutzhund started at the beginning of this century as a test for working dogs. Its initial purpose was to determine which dogs could be used for breeding and which had true working ability. The growing demand for working dogs made more sophisticated tests and training necessary. These dogs were needed for police training, border patrol, customs, military and herding. As these tests evolved, more people participated just for the sheer

enjoyment of seeing if their personal dogs could be trained as effectively as these "professional dogs." Now, over sixty years after the first formal Schutzhund rules were introduced, tens of thousands of people participate in the sport each year.

Schutzhund tests three specific areas of a dog's training and behavior: tracking, which requires the dog to track footsteps over mixed terrain; obedience, with many of the exercises similar to those in Open and Utility (with some exercises requiring the dog to work under the noise of a gunfire); and protection, with the key being the relationship between dog and handler — the Schutzhund dog is capable of the feats of never being aggressive except under specific situations, and even then it must always be under the absolute control of the handler.
